Puzzle Instructions

When completed, the grid will contain two series of words. The first series starts at No. 1, going outward on the left spiral and then continuing inward on the right spiral to No. 230. The second series of words starts at No. 230, going outward on the right spiral and then continuing inward on the left spiral to No. 1. Every space in the grid will be shared by exactly two answer words. Work from both sets of clues to complete the puzzle.

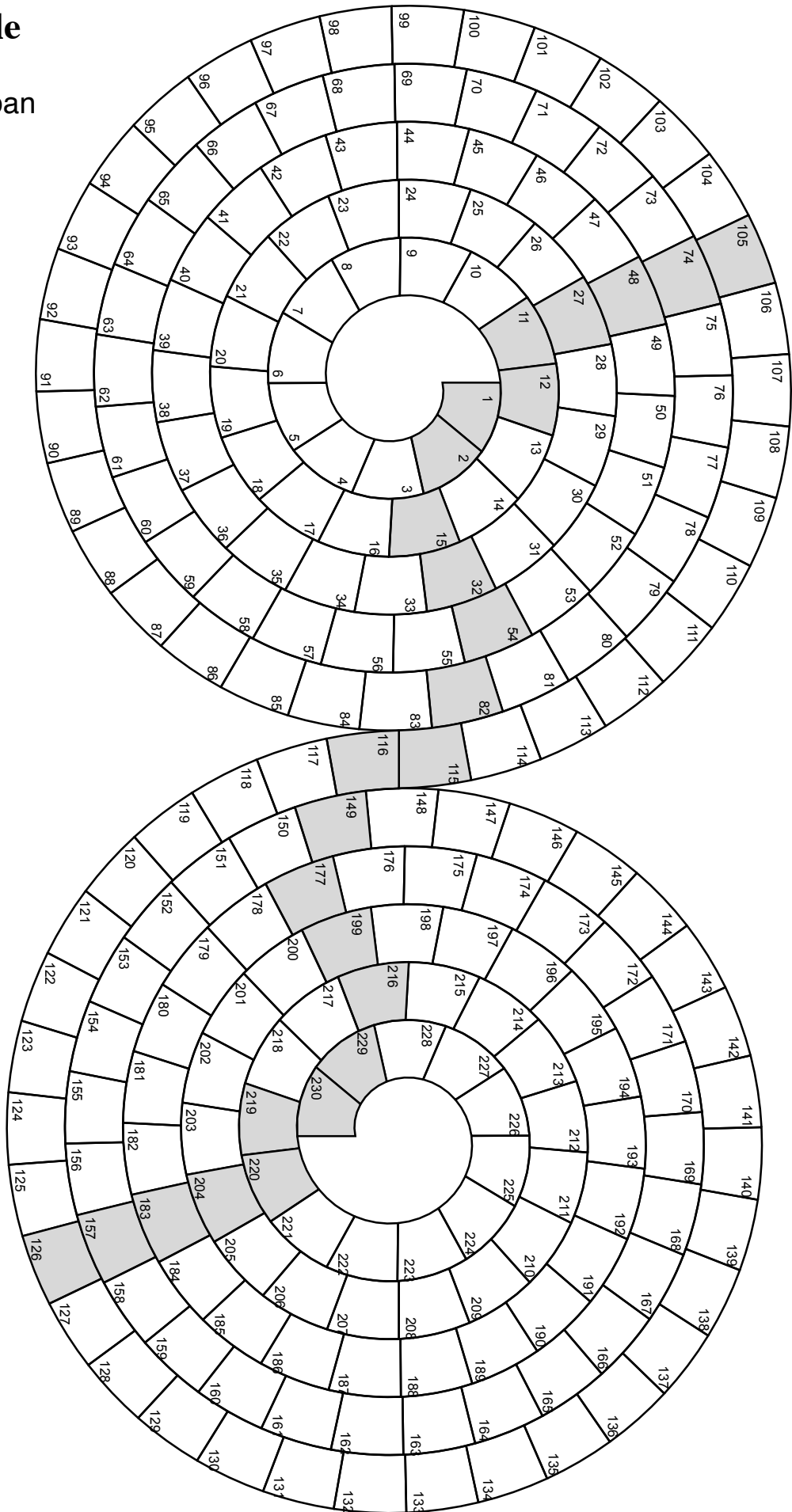
